## Finances

The vestry and finance committee have been very busy planning for the 2021 budget year and reviewing the 2020 budget. Despite all of the changes that have occurred due to the COVID-19 pandemic, our “little church with the red doors” has remained “open” to serve our church family and the surrounding community. Online services have become the new normal for now. While many of us long for our in-person worship, St. James has been able to continue to provide a weekly church service to our parish membership. We are in fact ahead of other parishes in the diocese in this regard. We remain connected. We have developed a closer relationship with Grace Episcopal Church through our Holy Friendship. We have also been involved in collaborative efforts with Christ Church in Norwich and St. David's in Gales Ferry.

Financially, we continue to show our perseverance, despite many obstacles. We have been good stewards with our money. We are current in our bills. We were able to meet our financial obligations without having to take funds from our endowment, which has allowed those investments to continue to grow and at the end of November, the endowment had fully recovered its original value at the end of 2019. Our proactive practices have kept our finances on stable ground. Due to the generosity of a few folks who have given more than they pledged, we met the pledge amount for 2020. If everyone is able to pay their 2020 pledge in full, we will be able to end the year without using the loan and will have enough funds to begin 2021 with adequate cash on hand. Our goal has been to be as fiscally responsible as possible while staying consistent with our worship and outreach, and we are meeting that goal due to your faithfulness.

As we move forward into the New Year, there remain many unknowns. What we do know is that St. James Episcopal Church in Preston is a resilient church. We will require the time, talents, and treasure of each of us in order to continue to do the work that God has given us to do for the benefit of all.

### **Episcopalians Provide Norwich Community Luncheon**

On Christ the King Sunday, the Holy Friendship parishes of Grace Church, Yantic and St. James Church, Preston along with Scout Troop 75 and Christ Church, Norwich provided 120 meals for the Norwich Community Luncheon. This is a Sunday meal provided weekly in rotation by churches and charitable organizations for the homeless and working poor of the Greater Norwich Region at St. Vincent de Paul Place, the Norwich area's largest soup kitchen, food pantry, and center for advocacy. With the region's COVID-19 cases spiking, participants divided up the effort, each providing a piece that could be assembled safely by a few people who could socially distance during the process. Gluten-free meals were assembled by Troop 75 (outdoors!), water and fruit were provided by Christ Church, and all of it was delivered to Grace where a small team from the Holy Friendship and Christ Church Norwich assembled the main meals and delivered them to Community Luncheon distributors at St. Vincent de Paul Place.

Reducing the impact of food insecurity is a major ministry for the Holy Friendship, and both parishes have forged a solid relationship with St. Vincent De Paul Place. People suffering from poverty, particularly during the COVID-19 pandemic, come from every corner of the Greater Norwich region, including Preston and Yantic, for meals and to get food for their households from the pantry. Before the pandemic, the Norwich Community Luncheon served about 70 meals on a Sunday; now the need has almost doubled. In the gospel reading for the Sunday this lunch took place, both parishes heard Jesus' invitation to serve those suffering from hunger and thirst: "...just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me."
